

## The Roosevelts

### 3.1 Theodore Roosevelt: His Life and Times on Film

DATA-DVD, (2008) (No Region Code), Good Quality

Library of Congress film collection on President Theodore Roosevelt. See accompanying guide for an overview of all films on this DVD. It can only be viewed on a PC.

### 3.2 The Democrat and the Dictator

"A Walk Through the Twentieth Century with Bill Moyers" series

DVD-PAL, 58 minutes (19??) (No Region Code), Average Quality

This documentary sheds light on the career of both the Democrat Franklin D. Roosevelt and the dictator Adolf Hitler. Thus the famous speeches of both men are compared, as well as their ideology and propaganda campaigns.

### 3.3 Eleanor Roosevelt's World

DVD-PAL, 50 minutes (1959-1962) (No Region Code), Good Quality

Selections from ER's television program "Prospects of Mankind," a program of interviews at Brandeis University, 1959-1962 with as guests: Senator, President J.F. Kennedy, Henry Kissinger, Bertrand Russell, Hubert Humphrey, J.K. Galbraith, Nelson Rockefeller, Adlai Stevenson Julius Nyerere, Chester Bowles, Sargent Shriver, Brezinski. Topics discussed are NATO, Peace Corps, Vietnam, disarmament, Third World, Cold War, Women's Rights.

### 3.4 Eleanor Roosevelt: First Lady of the World

DVD-PAL, 90 minutes (1982) (No Region Code), Good Quality

Dramatized television play with Dutch subtitles about the achievements of Eleanor Roosevelt in the period 1945-1948. The film tells the story of her acceptance of the U.N. position, her work behind the scenes, her relationship with friends and relatives, and her victory in 1948 when the United Nations adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The film ends with original footage on ER and an after-word by her grandson Curtis Roosevelt.

### 3.5 Theodore Roosevelt: Roughrider to Rushmore

"A Biography" series

DVD-NTSC, 50 minutes (1995) (No Region Code)

An intimate portrait of Theodore Roosevelt, which ranges from Roosevelt's sickly childhood to his remarkable career as amongst other things a police commissioner, conservationist, soldier and, eventually president of the United States.

### 3.6 TR: The Story of Theodore Roosevelt

"The American Experience" series

DVD-NTSC, 225 minutes (2006) (No Region Code), Good Quality

Host David McCullough tells the story of TR's life. He emphasizes his relationship with his parents, esp. with his father. Part 1 deals with his youth and upbringing, esp. with his role in the Spanish-American War. Part 2 is about the Bully Pulpit, TR's first term. It describes the Miners' Strike of 1902, the anti-trust measures, the Roosevelt Corollary, the Panama Canal and the other, softer side of TR. Part 3 & 4 lasts two hours and reveals TR's biggest mistake: his public announcement of not wanting to seek a third term. From 1907 his power waned. The story line emphasizes his turn to conquering nature, if his political initiatives fail, and his desire to experience heroic death. The friendship with William H. Taft develops into a cold enmity (his other friends, such as Henry Cabot Lodge are not mentioned). Relatively new is the story about his deteriorating health (half-blind, malaria, leg injury). His final campaign to support the Great War took an ugly anti-foreign turn. Especially the death of his favorite son Quentin made him doubt the wisdom of glorifying war and struggle. Interviews with William Harbaugh, John M. Blum, John Milton Cooper, John A. Gable, Walter La Feber and some family members. It is sympathetic to TR and even the Panama Canal scheme is treated from an American perspective.

### 3.7a FDR

"The American Experience" series

2 DVD-NTSC, 250 minutes (2006) (Region Code 1), Good Quality

This documentary, consisting of two volumes, gives a detailed account of the life and career of Franklin D. Roosevelt.  
Volume 1

Part 1: The Center of the World (1882-1921)

This part explores FDR's family background, his run for political office as New York state senator, his years in Washington as assistant secretary of the Navy and his presidency. It also chronicles the courtship of Eleanor, their troubled marriage, including his love affair with Lucy Mercer. This affair, which nearly ended their marriage, encouraged Eleanor to embrace a life of her own and become politically active.

Part 2: Fear Itself (1921-1933)

This documentary begins with FDR's paralysis at age 1939 and follows his struggle to rehabilitate himself. Eleanor starts to develop her own political skills. FDR returns to the national political theater as nominee for the Democratic Party and wins the presidency: a man who could not walk leads a country crippled by the Depression.

### 3.7b FDR

Part 3: The Grandest Job in the World (1933-1940)

The irony of FDR's presidency was that a man of privilege came to be identified with measures that made him a hero to a vast and varied coalition of ordinary Americans, and a villain to members of his own social class. This part how his programs and personal style restored confidence in the Americans.

Part 4: The Juggler (1940-1945)

FDR maneuvered support for England before leading his country into World War. His relationships with Churchill and Stalin, his efforts to keep the legacy of the New Deal, and his failing health are dealt with.

### 3.8 Roosevelt and the New Deal

DVD-PAL, 22 minutes (1977) (No Region Code), Average Quality

Excellent BBC documentary about the Depression and FDR's solutions. It starts with the dismal circumstances of 1932, provides a short biography of FDR and Eleanor, his campaign and inauguration. The Brains Trust helps him to explore feasible solutions. A short overview of the most significant alphabet organizations and the problems of various parts of the population. The Dust Bowl victims are contrasted with the Hollywood glitter. FDR's opponents and the Court Packing case. Eventually, the war preparations help to revive the economy.

### 3.9 The Speeches Collection — Franklin D. Roosevelt

DVD-NTSC, 45 minutes (1990) (No Region Code)

This documentary shows fragments of the inaugurations of 1933 and 1937, fire-side chats, campaign speeches. The tape does not provide complete coverage of the speeches, but parts, some brief, some lengthy.

### 3.10 FDR:

#### Man in the White House

DVD-PAL, 30 minutes (1989) (No Region Code), Good Quality

After a documentary introduction showing footage of the nomination, election campaign, and inauguration of FDR, actor Robert Vaughn, in wheel chair with cigarette, tells jokes and the story of his life, from the days he was struck with polio. He reveals his friendships, his political strategy, his way of dealing with the press and his counselors, but also how he moves around as a handicapped person, and how that formed his attitude towards life and politics.

### 3.11 Eleanor Roosevelt

"The American Experience" series

DVD-NTSC, 150 minutes (2005) (Region Code 1), Good Quality

This PBS-documentary provides an in-depth account of Eleanor Roosevelt's life. Starting with her tragic childhood, it explores her rise as a politician's wife and politician in her own right. Rare home movies, the voice recordings of Eleanor Roosevelt herself, and still photographs are interwoven with recollections from friends and relatives, including grandchildren Nina Roosevelt Gibson, Eleanor Seagraves, Franklin Roosevelt III, Curtis Roosevelt, and niece Eleanor Roosevelt. Civil rights leader James Farmer, in one of the last interviews given before his death, describes Eleanor's role in Marian Anderson's landmark 1939 concert at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., while historians Blanche Wiesen Cook, Allida Black, and Geoffrey Ward examine her legacy. The documentary sheds light on both Eleanor's personal life—her marriage with Franklin, the Lucy Mercer affair, Eleanor's friendship with Lorena Hickok—and her political life. Her role in the new deal, her position as first lady, and her role at the United Nations all feature prominently in this documentary.

### 3.12 KRO Network: Eleanor Roosevelt

DVD-PAL, 15 minutes (2003) (No Region Code), Good Quality

A short television documentary broadcasted on November 7, 2003, on the occasion of the publication of the book *Grandmère*, a personal history of Eleanor Roosevelt. The documentary intermingles interviews with the author and grandson David B. Roosevelt, and Professor Cornelis A. van Minnen, director of the Roosevelt Study Center, with footage of Eleanor Roosevelt visits to the Netherlands and her 1948 historical speech to the United Nations General Assembly.

### 3.13 Warm Springs

DVD-NTSC, 120 minutes (2004) (Region Code 1), Good Quality

This five time Emmy Award winning HBO film portrays FDR not during his presidency, but during a personal difficult time before his first presidential nomination while recovering from what had been diagnosed as polio. Being filmed at Warm Springs, Georgia, the actual site of Roosevelt's recovery, this movie has been praised for using as many of the historic sites as possible. Directed by Joseph Sargent with Kenneth Branagh as FDR and Cynthia Nixon as Eleanor Roosevelt.

### 3.14 A Rendezvous with History: The Roosevelts of Hyde Park

DVD-NTSC, 22 minutes (2003) (No Region Code), Good Quality

This documentary is made for the Henry A. Wallace Visitor and Education Center, Hyde Park, in order to give visitors of the FDR Presidential Library and FDR National Historic Site an introduction to the lives of Franklin Delano and Eleanor Roosevelt. The film alternates between historic footage and period music, and personal reflections on the lives of FDR and ER by two of their grandchildren, Curtis Roosevelt and Anna Eleanor Roosevelt.

### 3.15a The Roosevelts in Newsreels (1933-1962), part 1 of 2

Collection of newsreel reports on Franklin D. Roosevelt and Eleanor Roosevelt from the National Archives, Washington D.C. This DVD includes newsreels 31 to 42.

### 3.16 The Eleanor Roosevelt Story

DVD-PAL, 90 minutes (1965) (No Region Code), Good Quality

Assembled three years after Eleanor Roosevelt's death, the Oscar-winning *The Eleanor Roosevelt Story* is a reverent documentary of one of the most influential – and controversial – first ladies in American history. We watch as Eleanor becomes a major public figure in her own right, from her tireless support of her husband during his 1921 bout with infantile paralysis through her twelve years in the White House. Special attention is paid to Eleanor's activities on behalf of civil rights, at a time when it was considered unfashionable (and politically suicidal) to take such stands.

### 3.17 – 3.45 “The Prospects of Mankind” series

From 1959 through 1962, former First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt hosted twenty-nine roundtable discussions, called the Prospects of Mankind series, to tackle critical issues of the day that were important to Americans, as well as to the international community of academic, journalists, philosophers, and politicians. The program was produced by Educational Broadcasting Corporation (NET) and WGBH Educational Foundation.

### 3.17 New Possibilities for Coexistence

“The Prospects of Mankind” series

DVD, 60 minutes (October 1959)

Program Guests: V.K. Krishna, India's Defense Minister and the head of the Indian Delegation to the United Nations General Assembly; Robert R. Bowie, Director of the Center for International Affairs at Harvard University and former Assistant Secretary of State for Policy Planning; Harrison Salisbury, New York Times international expert.

### 3.18 What Hopes for Disarmament

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (November 1959)

Program Guests: Jules Moch, France's leading disarmament expert and representative to the United Nations General Assembly; Trevor Gardner, former Assistant Secretary of the Air Force and President of the Highcon[?] Manufacturing Company, producer of guided missile components; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor.

### 3.19 Foreign Aid and Economic Policy

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (December 1959)

Program Guests: Madame Vijay Lakshmi Pandit, India's High Commissioner to the United Kingdom and sister of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru (NOTE: Madame Pandit withdrew from the program and was replaced by Rajendra "Raju" Coomaraswamy, Delegate from Ceylon to the United Nations and former President of the Colombo Plan Council); John Kenneth Galbraith, Professor of Economics at Harvard University and author of The Affluent Society; Dr. Arthur Lewis, Deputy Director of the United Nations Special Fund, former President of the University College of the British West Indies and advisor to Prime Minister Nkrumah of Ghana.

### 3.20 Europe Faces East and West

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (January 1960)

Program Guests: Senator John F. Kennedy, member of the United States Senate's Foreign Relations Committee; Erwin D. Canham, Editor of The Christian Science Monitor and President of the United States Chamber of Commerce; Paul Rosenstein-Rodan, Professor of Economics at the Center for International Studies, M.I.T. Issues discussed on the program include: the two rival trade groups and the consequences for the U.S. economy, the chances for resolving the differences among the allies of Berlin, NATO's precarious military situation, and the prospects for a joint European- American aid program to the world's underdeveloped areas. NOTE: Senator John F. Kennedy announced his candidacy for the U.S. presidency before flying to Boston to record this program later the same day (January 2, 1960).

### 3.21 Latin America: Neglected Neighbors

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (February 1960)

Program Guests: Nelson Rockefeller, Governor of New York; Luis Munoz-Marin, Governor of Puerto Rico; Benjamin Cohen, former Chilean Ambassador to the United Nations and former Undersecretary of the United Nations; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor. The program addresses political developments in Cuba and Panama, economic problems in Venezuela, the vitalization of social and financial progress in Puerto Rico ("Operation Bootstrap") and the future of the Central and South American republics.

### 3.22 Africa: Revolution in Haste

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (March 1960)

Program Guests: Julius Nyerere, founder of the Tanganyika African National Union (TANU), Chief Minister of British-ruled Tanganyika, later the first Prime Minister of Tanganyika (now Tanzania); Barbara Ward, resident of Ghana, distinguished economist, writer and lecturer at Harvard University; Ralph Bunche, Nobel Peace Prize winner and United Nations Undersecretary for Special Political Affairs; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor.

### 3.23 The American Image Abroad

“The Prospects of Mankind” series

DVD, 60 minutes (April 1960)

Program Guests: Denis W. Brogan, Professor of Political Science at Cambridge University, England; Harlan Cleveland, Dean of the Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Syracuse University, and senior author of *The Overseas Americans*; Santha Rama Rau, Indian author; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor. The program examines the reasons why America is disliked in some parts of the world, and what can be done about it. Discussions focus on American tourists, diplomats, and businessmen in overseas activities, as well as the role American movies play in shaping the country's image abroad.

### 3.24 China: Shadow on the Summit

“The Prospects of Mankind” series

DVD, 60 minutes (May 1960)

Program Guests: Charles O. Porter, Representative (D-Ore.) and advocate of change in the United States' policy toward China; Blair Fraser, Canada's leading political journalist and Editor of *Maclean's Magazine*; Zbigniew K. Brzezinski, member of the Harvard University Government Department and an Associate of the Russian Research Center and the Center for International Affairs at Harvard; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor. The program examines the inclusion of China in disarmament talks, the future of Chinese-Soviet relations, and possible changes in the United States foreign policy on China.

### 3.25 The Future of Democracy Abroad

“The Prospects of Mankind” series

DVD, 60 minutes (June 1960)

Program Guests: Adlai Stevenson, former Governor of Illinois and twice Democratic candidate for the U.S. Presidency; Dr. Mohammed Hatta, former Prime Minister and former Vice President of Indonesia; Henry Kissinger, Associate Director of Harvard University's Center for International Affairs and author of the bestseller, *Nuclear Weapons and Foreign Policy*; Saville Davis, Managing Editor of The Christian Science Monitor. The program examines factors that assail the long-term spread and survival of democracy in the West and the underdeveloped countries of Asia, Africa and Latin America, and their implications for U.S. policy. The program marks one of Adlai Stevenson's rare appearances on television to that point.

### 3.26 Britain: Ally or Neutral

“The Prospects of Mankind” series

DVD, 60 minutes (September 1960)

Program Guests: Hugh Gaitskell, socialist member of Parliament and leader of the British Labor Party; Bertrand Russell, scientist, philosopher, and Nobel Prize winner in literature; Lord Robert Boothby, independent member of the House of Lords; Robert McKenzie, political sociologist at the London School of Economics. The program examines varying British points of view on defense and disarmament policies.

### 3.27 European Unity: Obstacles and Goals

Program Guests: Denis Healy, journalist and leading Labor Party spokesman for foreign affairs; Maurice Schumann, President of the French National Assembly's Foreign Affairs Commission; Anthony Nutting, Minister of State and author of *Europe Will not Wait*; Robert McKenzie, political sociologist at the London School of Economics.

### 3.28 The Changing Shape of the United Nations

Program Guests: Lawrence Fuchs, Dean of the Faculty at Brandeis University and co-instructor with Eleanor Roosevelt of a course on international organization and law; Raymond Aron, France's leading political writer, Professor of Sociology at the Sorbonne, author of *The Century of Total War*, columnist for *Le Figaro*, France's leading newspaper, and author of a three volume study of war; General Carlos Romulo, Philippines Ambassador to the United States, President of the United Nations Fourth General Assembly, former President of the Security Council (1957), and co-author of the United Nations charter in 1945; Senator Michael Mansfield (D-Mont.), probable successor to Lyndon Johnson as Senate Majority Leader and two-time delegate to the United Nations General Assembly.

### 3.31 The Peace Corps: What Shape Shall it Take?

Program Guest: President John F. Kennedy Program opens with a ten minute segment in which President Kennedy is interviewed one-on-one by Eleanor Roosevelt, discussing the advent of the Peace Corps. The opening segment was recorded at the White House in Washington, D.C. on March 5, 1961, the day the President issued the executive order creating the Peace Corps. The remainder of the program was recorded at WTTG Studios in Washington, D.C. Program Guests: Senator Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.), chief supporter of legislation for the permanence and expansion of the Peace Corps, Chairman of the Disarmament Subcommittee of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee; Samuel Hays, author of *The Peace Corps Task Force Report* requested by President Kennedy and a social scientist in the Department of Economics at the University of Michigan; Senteca Kajubi, from Makerere College University of East Africa in Uganda, which will receive the first group of Peace Corps teachers, and presently at the University of Chicago; R. Sargent Shriver, Chairman of the Chicago Board of Education and newly named Director of the Peace Corps.

### 3.32 Congo: Challenge to the United Nations

Program Guests: Ambassador Adlai Stevenson, Chief American Representative to the United Nations; G. ### 3.34 American Capitalism: Challenged at Home and Abroad

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (September 1961)

Program Guests: Walter Reuther, President of the United Automobile Workers and President of the CIO Division of the AFL-CIO; Eric A. Johnston, President of the Motion Picture Association, former Chairman of the International Development Board, Special Representative of President Eisenhower to the Middle East, and President of the United States Chamber of Commerce from 1942-1946; Paul A. Samuelson, Professor of Economics at M.I.T. and economic advisor to candidate and President-elect John F. Kennedy; Robert McKenzie, well-known television moderator and a political sociologist at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Erwin D. Canham, Editor of the Christian Science Monitor, moderates the conversation (substituting for Eleanor Roosevelt). The guests discuss whether America's economic system is one of free enterprise or of mixed economy. They also analyze the need for more comprehensive planning to strengthen the United States' domestic economy and to enable the U.S. to compete successfully in world markets.

### 3.35 Berlin: What Choice Remains

DVD, 60 minutes (October 1961)

Program opens with a ten minute interview conducted by Eleanor Roosevelt with Secretary of State Dean Rusk. Remainder of program is typical discussion format with program guests: Max Freedman, Washington correspondent for Britain's Manchester Guardian newspaper; Henry Kissinger, Director of Defense Studies at Harvard University; James Reston, Chief of the Washington, D.C. Bureau of the New York Times; Paul Tillich, renowned German-born theologian and philosopher; Dean Rusk, United States Secretary of State.

### 3.36 United Nations: Future Endangered

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (November 1961)

Program Guests: Harlan Cleveland, Assistant Secretary of State, in charge of United Nations Affairs, and Editor and Publisher of The Reporter magazine; C.S. Jha, Indian Ambassador to the United Nations; Stanley Hoffman, Professor of Government at Harvard University; William Frye, United Nations correspondent for The Christian Science Monitor.

### 3.37 South Asia in Crisis

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (December 1961)

Program Guests: Jacob Javits, Republican senator from New York, member of the Senate Banking and Currency, Government Operations, and Labor and Public Welfare Committees; Vu Van Thai, Director General of the budget of the Ngo

Dinh Diem government of South Vietnam for six years before his recent resignation, currently lecturing in the U. S.; Peggy Durdin, longtime Far East freelance correspondent for the New York Times; Leo Cherne, Chairman of the International Rescue Committee and Executive Director of the Research Institute of America who has spent much time in Vietnam. The program addresses the present situation in Vietnam, the need for reforms in the Ngo Dinh Diem government, the extent of U.S. military support, the consequences for the West of the new neutralism of Laos, and the importance of the entire area to the free world.

### 3.38 Latin America Looks at Cuba

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (January 1962)

Program Guests: Adlai Stevenson, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations (who introduces the program in a special ten minute sequence with Eleanor Roosevelt); Roberto Campos, Brazilian Ambassador to the United Nations; Theodore Draper, specialist in international Communism and author of *Castro's Cuba and Cuba and U.S. Policy*; Ted Szulc, Latin American correspondent for the New York Times. The program explores the possibility of a censure of Cuba at the forthcoming meeting of the Organization of American States, and the reasons why a number of Latin American countries are reluctant to take such a step. The guests also analyze Castro's Cuba as a staging area for propaganda and military intervention in other Latin American countries, and the Kennedy Alliance for Progress as a counter measure to the Cuban Youth. Opening segment with Adlai Stevenson was recorded at the United Nations in New York.

### 3.39 Russia and China: What Does the Future Hold

"The Prospects of Mankind" series

DVD, 60 minutes (February 1962)

Program Guests: Allen Dulles, former Director of the Central Intelligence Agency; Reinhold Niebuhr, renowned Protestant theologian and Visiting Professor of Government at Harvard University; Lord Lindsay of Birker, Professor and Chairman of the Far Eastern Program of the School of International Service at the American University in Washington, D.C.; Seymour Friedin, recently appointed Executive Foreign Editor of the New York Herald Tribune; Marshall Shulman, Associate Director of the Russian Research Center at Harvard University. The program explores the causes of the present Russia-China rift and the likelihood of its developing into a complete break. The guests discuss specific U.S. foreign policy moves that might be made to take advantage of the dispute as well as the directions that Soviet foreign policy might take as a result of the rift.

partnership, as well as the relation between President Kennedy's tariff bill and the Common Market. The major portion of this program was recorded at Radiodiffusion Television Francaise in Paris. A postlude with Undersecretary of State George Ball was recorded in Washington, D.C.
