Hendrik Willem van Loon, 1882-1944. Papers, 1884-1972

The van Loon papers are deposited at Cornell University (Ithaca, New York) and a selection of this material, 21 reels, has been microfilmed for the Roosevelt Study Center. The reels contain correspondence to and from van Loon (major correspondents include public figures such as Franklin D. Roosevelt, Herbert Hoover, and Fiorello LaGuardia), a selection of manuscript materials and memorabilia, and the papers of his wife "Jimmie" and his son Gerard Willem van Loon.

In addition, a selection of the *New Leader* (1940 and 1943), to which van Loon regularly contributed, has been added to the collection (reel 22), as well as a part of the H.L. Mencken papers (reel 23), including Mencken's correspondence with van Loon. This reel contains box 109: Untermeyer, Louis – box 111: Warner, Eltinge F.

<u>Introduction – Original Collection (Cornell University)</u>

The 35 cubic feet of Hendrik Willem van Loon papers consists primarily of personal correspondence, manuscripts, printed material, illustrations, memorabilia, and family papers. This material documents extensively van Loon's life as an author, illustrator, and journalist, as well as reactions to major events in New York and Europe.

Van Loon's correspondence is noteworthy for both its content and its illustrative drawings. He spent much time adding pen-and-ink or watercolor sketches to his letters and their envelopes. Van Loon also corresponded with many notable literary and public figures of his time. Much of the correspondence from 1939 to 1942 deals with refugees from Nazi persecution and van Loon's participation in war relief fund raising and committees.

The manuscript material depicts van Loon's particular method of writing. Oftentimes he would hand write an entire manuscript and have Helen Criswell van Loon ("Jimmie") type it, he would then go back and add annotations to his draft. After whole new pages of handwritten corrections were inserted, the draft would be re-typed or left as is, to be reworked later. Books also started out with a specific title and concept or outline. These were placed in a manila folder. Book "ideas" were then either dropped completely or became part of the book writing process described above.

There are many photographs of van Loon and his family and friends; scrapbooks and guest books from Nieuw Veere, his residence in Greenwich, Connecticut and; diaries and journals, including over 30 years of day-to-day diaries kept by "Jimmie" van Loon. The family papers of both "Jimmie" and van Loon's second son, Gerard Willem, are also included in the collection.

Note: HWVL = Hendrik Willem van Loon

HCVL = Helen Criswell van Loon, most often referred to as "Jimmie"

This collection contains material in English, Dutch, and German.

Series arrangement and description.

Series I. General correspondence is divided into two subseries:

(Boxes 1-3)

subseries 1. A chronological arrangement of general correspondence.

subseries 2. Correspondence of a particular topic arranged chronologically.

Series II. (Boxes 4-17, F.10)

Family correspondence of ten or more letters arranged chronologically. Family members include Hendrik's immediate family of parents, aunts, uncles, and two sons, and Eliza Bowditch van Loon's parents, her siblings, and cousins. Also postcards to and from family members. Major correspondence of ten or more letters between those friends with whom Hendrik maintained a regular correspondence is included in this series. Also included is correspondence between his second wife, Helen Criswell van Loon, and his third wife, Frances Ames Goodrich. This material is listed alphabetically by correspondent and arranged chronologically.

Series III. (Boxes 17, F.11-19)

Major correspondents include those individuals who were considered important personalities in the 1900's-1940's, with whom Hendrik wrote irregularly (less than ten letters). This material is listed alphabetically and includes number of letters and inclusive dates. Also included in this series are draft copies of correspondence and microfilmed correspondence.

Series IV. (Boxes 20-26)

Manuscript material includes carbons, drafts, and typescript for articles, books, broadcasts, lectures, serials, and HWVL's thesis. Book material is arranged alphabetically by title. Articles, broadcasts, lectures, serials, and the thesis are arranged separately in chronological order when possible. The letters N/A were used when no title was available.

Series V. (Boxes 27-34)

Printed material consists mainly of English and foreign translations of various van Loon books; articles about van Loon in both foreign and American papers and magazines; reviews; promotional book material; cruise ship pamphlets; copies of illustrations that appeared in various newspapers and magazines; and miscellaneous clippings.

Series VI. (Boxes 35-52)

Illustrative material includes the illustrations made for many van Loon books arranged by book title; sketches for unfinished books; sketchbooks; illustrated stories and unpublished material; illustrated folders, envelopes, and menus; small pen-and-ink and watercolour sketches either mounted or on mats; ornate

matted sketches; book jackets; many miscellaneous sketches; and portraits of van Loon by other artists.

Series VII. (Boxes 53-62 Map Case Special Collections)

Memorabilia is divided into two subseries:

subseries 1. Includes scrapbooks, guestbooks, photograph albums and photographs, notebooks, diaries, passports, pamphlets, certificates, diplomas, phonograph record, games, puzzles, and miscellaneous.

subseries 2. collected memorabilia includes various miscellaneous documents, volumes, and reprints collected by van Loon.

Series VIII. (Boxes 63-64)

Papers of Helen Criswell "Jimmie" van Loon include an original play, diaries, "Mad Hatter Mutterings," and other miscellaneous material.

Series IX. (Boxes 65-67)

Papers of Gerard Willem van Loon includes drafts and photos for his biography about Hendrik Willem van Loon, and correspondence pertaining to his father and the manuscript.
