

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# **GENERAL INTRODUCTION**

Few institutions are so little understood as the national committees of the two major parties in America. Not even the members of the national committees always understand how they function. More than one newly appointed national committeeman or committeewoman, proud of the honor that had just been bestowed, has been heard to ask, "What is it that I am supposed to do?" Little wonder. For the national committees are, in truth, singular institutions that can change their shapes as rapidly as spirits on a misty heath. In addition, they have rarely been studied, in no small part because, until now, their records have not been conveniently accessible.

At first glance, the structure of the Republican National Committee (RNC) appears to be very well defined. The Republican Party, drawing on precedents set by the Democrats and the Whigs, authorized the establishment of its first national committee at its first national convention in June 1856, and the national committees have, ostensibly, always been, and are today, creatures of the national convention.

Without doubt, it has been the conventions that have determined the size and composition of the committees. At the outset, the national committee was comprised of a member from each state and territory and from the District of Columbia. After the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment, convention delegates stipulated that each state or other unit should have a woman as well as a man on the committee. (Since a committee of more than one hundred members has, not surprisingly, proved to be unwieldy, the Republicans have also established an executive committee, which has sometimes been important, sometimes not, depending on the inclination of the chairman.) Technically speaking, the members of the committee are not even chosen by their state parties but only nominated by state organizations and actually appointed by the convention. In accordance with procedures established at conventions, members of national committees serve a four-year term--from one national convention to the next. They take office at the time of the first meeting after the convention, and their terms do not expire until the end of the next convention.

The significance of the national convention emerged, unmistakably, in 1952 when the Republican delegates adopted Rule 22, providing that a state chairman could serve as an additional member on the national committee if at the preceding presidential contest his state had cast its electoral votes for the GOP nominee, or if his state had chosen a Republican governor or sent a majority of Republicans to Congress. Furthermore, the party chairman of any territory could also have a place on the national committee if the territory had a Republican delegate elected to Congress. Among the immediate consequences of Rule 22, with its bonus provision for states delivering for the Republicans, was diminished power within the party for the South, a region of Democratic preponderance, and for women, since the added spot in each state was almost certain to go to a man, thereby changing a 1:1 male-female ratio in that state to a 2:1 ratio.

Yet despite this fundamental power of the conventions, the national committees, both Republican and Democratic, are remarkably free of supervision, or even direction. The delegates to the national conventions, meeting for only a few days every four years, are much too preoccupied with matters such as choosing a presidential nominee and drafting a platform to meddle in the affairs of the national committee. For most of the subsequent four years of the committee's existence, there is, of course,

no convention in session even to consider a guiding role. Nor is there any constitution detailing the powers of the committee, and though there is a compilation of rules that have grown up over time, it is astonishingly sparse, with the Republican manual scantier than the Democratic.

Somewhat more surprisingly, the national headquarters of the party, in turn, operates with almost no oversight from the national committee. For a time, members of the executive committee of the national committee headed divisions at headquarters, but by the 1950s, the Republicans had only one such functionary. The committee does have the power to choose the party chairman, but in almost every instance that choice has actually been made by the party's presidential candidate. On occasion, when a vacancy develops, the committee may exercise some free will, as when in the 1946-52 era it chose two chairmen, Carroll Reece and Guy Gabrielson, who were not conspicuously identified with the titular head of the party, Thomas E. Dewey. But those instances are exceptional. The usual procedure is that the presidential nominee picks the chairman, and the chairman chooses the staff. Hence the national office is very much in the shadow of the party chairman, who speaks in the name of the Republican National Committee.

To locate the center of power in the Republican Party, one should look not at the convention, nor the committeemen, nor the headquarters staff, but at the chairman, for it is the chairman who gives the national party leadership its actual shape. The national chairman makes speeches, plays a role in formulating policy positions, dispenses patronage, attempts to assuage the aggrieved who have not received plums, and, in the words of Senator Hugh D. Scott, Jr., is a "thousand-fingered Dutch boy" rushing about to plug up leaks in the party's dikes. No longer does fund raising occupy much of his time as it did in the nineteenth century and the early twentieth century, for that function has largely been taken over by the treasurer and finance committees in the modern era. But the chairman does continue to play an important role in allocating money. Though initially the national chairman and the campaign manager were two different people, in recent times the national chairman has generally managed the campaign too, as representative of the party's presidential candidate.

The national chairman, however much he attempts to serve as a harmonizer, is, in fact, generally recognized to be the spokesman for the most powerful faction in the party. That role is especially important when the party is out of power. In the nineteenth century, party chairmen were always chosen from the ranks of the committee, but in the twentieth century, that practice has been an exception, and the presidential nominee is free to range widely in exercising his prerogative. Chairmen are not, though, always mere agents of the candidate. Some party chairmen have made full use of their position to exercise real authority in the party, as did Leonard Hall in the Eisenhower era.

Despite all of the significance of their office, however, there has been a remarkable turnover in party chairmen, no doubt in good part because of the frustrations of an office where there is more responsibility than power. One Republican national chairman, H. Meade Alcorn, Jr., has called the holder of that office "the least appreciated, most abused, and most harassed party official in the country." In their first century, the Republicans had no fewer than forty different chairmen, and only the first incumbent, Edwin D. Morgan, and the inimitable Mark Hanna served for eight years.

Under the leadership of the party chairman, the national committee (or its surrogates in headquarters) exercises a variety of functions. The national committee is the party's chief fund-raising instrumentality, and the main spender of money once it is raised. It plays a particularly important role with respect to the quadrennial national convention. It selects the site and the date of the convention; chooses the temporary officers, including the temporary chairman, who is the keynoter; and prepares the roll of delegates. In that capacity, it may be called upon to decide contests over seats, though its decisions can be reversed by the credentials committee at the convention. The national committee, on occasion, has even taken part in preparing the platform. And, most important, the national committee--again largely through the chairman and the headquarters staff--manages national campaigns.

Nothing that the national committee does is as important as its campaign activities. Though it carries on its work throughout the year, it is especially on the occasion of national elections, and to a lesser extent midterm elections, that it seeks to persuade the country that Republican policies and candidates are preferable. During national campaigns, in fact, party headquarters greatly increase in size, with both additional paid personnel and volunteers, and the Speakers' Bureau is kept busy responding to requests for speakers and scheduling radio and television time. The party is often even

more pertinacious about publicizing what it perceives to be the shortcomings of its opponents than it is in advertising the virtues of its own candidates. Thus, for example, the Republicans put out a publication, *Trumania*, which pulled together "Harry S Truman's letters and insults, political immorality, policy reversals, and foreign policy errors."

As the chief campaign instrumentality, the national committee, or, again, more particularly, the party chairman and headquarters personnel, have to keep in touch with state and local party committees and with independent campaign organizations, which have become increasingly important. The National Citizens for Eisenhower-Nixon in 1952 did not even operate out of Washington, where the national committee is housed, but from New York City. The national committee must also coordinate the efforts of its multifarious divisions, such as those appealing to minorities and young people. The minorities division has sought to exploit the suspicion of Democrats of Eastern European lineage that their party has been "soft" toward Soviet Russia and to woo back blacks, once a reliable segment of the party of the Great Emancipator. Though the Democrats have traditionally had a great appeal to the young, the Republicans have continued to seek the allegiance of young people. In 1946, the Young Republican National Federation, which began in 1931 and was formally organized in 1935, was given official recognition by the party, and in recent years the GOP has been increasingly successful in mobilizing youth.

Still more important have been the Women's Division and the National Federation of Republican Women. As early as 1892, women were seated at the Republican National Convention (as alternates from Wyoming), and in 1918 the chairman of the Republican National Committee, Will Hays, asked Ruth Hanna McCormick, Mark Hanna's daughter, to head a division on women's activities. Over the years, too, a number of Republican women's clubs were organized, and, following a meeting of Republican National Committeewomen in Chicago in the fall of 1937, these hitherto independent clubs were amalgamated into the National Federation of Republican Women. In 1944, the Republican National Convention formally recognized the influence of women by giving official status to the position of "An Assistant Chairman who shall be a woman" to head the Women's Division and have membership status on the Republican National Committee.

The Republican National Committee also maintains liaison with congressional party committees, though these are altogether independent of the RNC. The Republican Congressional Campaign Committee traces its origins at least as far back as 1866, and after direct election of senators was mandated by Constitutional amendment, the committee divided into House and Senate campaign committees, each independent not only of the Republican National Committee but of the legal authority of the national convention. These campaign committees should be distinguished from the Senate policy committee, created by statute in 1947 to devise legislative policy with a small appropriation for staff. There is, in addition, a House Republican Policy Committee, set up in 1949 simply by renaming the House steering committee. Unlike its Senate counterpart, it has no statutory authority or staff. Neither policy committee, in any event, has ever functioned truly as a policy-formulating body, for individual members of Congress are too jealous of their prerogatives to allocate such authority.

Though this congeries of committees--formal and informal, with lines of authority often hard to trace out, with activities often determined primarily by the force of personality of the chairman--closely resembles that of its Democratic rival, certain aspects mark it as unmistakably Republican. It has been said, jestingly, that the main difference between the parties is that when a Republican pours you a drink, he uses a jigger, and it is true that, unlike the Democrats, the Republicans have usually operated with an organization chart. In addition, the staff of the Republican National Committee has tended to be larger, and better paid, than that of the Democrats, and the Republicans have much more impressive offices. Under Leonard Hall's chairmanship in the Eisenhower era, the Republican national headquarters, wrote Stewart Alsop, had the appearance of the "home office of a large and successful business concern, complete with modern furniture, efficient secretaries, crew cut and flannel suited young men, the latest business machines, a multiplicity of mysterious charts, and a vast conference room with the latest motion pictures and television equipment."

Until now, the records of the Republican National Committee (as well as those of the Democratic National Committee) have been all but unavailable. As an article in the authoritative *American Archivist* observed: "Undoubtedly, these records contain material of priority interest to students of recent

American politics. It is extremely difficult, however, to obtain direct or even indirect access to the committees' records. Usually the permission of the chairman of a committee is required for one to search through an organization's files; this privilege is rarely granted unless the searcher is vouched for by top-level party officials." Now these records, absolutely indispensable to every historian and political scientist who wants to understand the American political process, can be on the shelves of every university library.

# INTRODUCTION

Origin: The Republican Party was loosely organized in 1854, when its first recorded meeting was held in Ripon, Wisconsin, attended by Whigs, Free Soilers, and Democrats united in their opposition to the extension of slavery. That same year other meetings were held in northern and midwestern states to create Republican organizations. A member of the U.S. House of Representatives from Maine, Israel Washburn, Jr., called about thirty of his colleagues together and they agreed that a new party should be formed under the name "Republican."

The most significant gathering of Republicans in 1854 was a true convention held "Under the Oaks" in Jackson, Michigan, attended by hundreds of leading citizens from all over the state. That convention adopted a platform and nominated candidates for all state offices. Because this was the first convention of Republicans, Jackson is frequently considered the birthplace of the Republican Party.

On February 22 and 23, 1856, delegates from a number of states met in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and appointed a National Executive Committee consisting of one representative from each state. The delegates authorized the committee to call a national convention to be held in Philadelphia in June of that year. When the first Republican National Convention convened, it elected a Republican National Committee (RNC) to serve until the next national nominating convention, four years later. A chairman was elected, and the committee was authorized in the rules adopted by the convention to determine where the next national convention would be held.

Thus the Republican National Committee became the creature of the national nominating convention, and still remains so. The national convention is the supreme authority of the party, since it gives the Republican National Committee the power to serve as the link between conventions. The Republican National Committee is not bound by any laws, state or federal. It is an unincorporated association of individuals created and governed by the rules adopted by the preceding convention and is re-created by each succeeding convention. The RNC has no charter or bylaws. Supreme Court decisions have upheld the right of national political parties, under the First Amendment of the Constitution, to determine their membership and, under the Fourteenth Amendment, to be protected from infringement by any state.

**Purpose:** The purpose of the Republican National Committee is basically the same today as it was in 1856. Modern methods of communication, organization, travel, and computerization have expanded its influence and facilitated its activities, but it is still the vehicle that, every four years, brings together delegates and alternate delegates selected in every state, the District of Columbia, and territorial possessions for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice President of the United States, adopting a platform on which those candidates run for office, and creating rules to govern the National Committee for the ensuing four years.

**Organization:** The organization of the Republican National Committee has also not changed significantly since its early years. The Republican National Committee members are selected by their states in one of several ways, depending on state party rules and/or state law: by primary election, by state central committee, or by state convention. Since 1976, the national convention ratifies these

nominees; prior to that they were elected by the convention. This election or ratification has usually been a pro forma action by the convention. The convention delegates have, in the past, settled disputes concerning National Committee nominees, but no conflict has arisen within the convention itself for many years. When vacancies occur between conventions, the state committee elects a replacement who is then ratified by the National Committee.

At the first meeting following the national convention, the members elect a chairman, co-chairman, secretary, and treasurer. As a rule the chairman is a person recommended by the presidential nominee. The chairman and co-chairman must be of the opposite sex. Only once in the history of the committee has there been a woman chairman, Mary Louise Smith of lowa (see Appendix I). The chairman appoints a general counsel and chairman of the Republican National Finance Committee.

At the same meeting, under present rules, eight vice chairmen, one man and one woman from each of the four regions, are elected by the members from the regions. This is a fairly recent change in organization; in the past there were four vice chairmen, two men and two women, sometimes appointed by the chairman and sometimes elected.

The Executive Committee remained more or less static for many years. It consisted of fifteen members of the National Committee who were either appointed by the chairman or elected by the members of the National Committee. The officers and the heads of auxiliary organizations were ex officio members of the Executive Committee. In the rules adopted by the 1984 Republican National Convention, changes were instituted that make the concept of an Executive Committee more workable and valuable to the chairman. A chairman's Executive Council was designated, consisting of the chairman, co-chairman, secretary, treasurer, general counsel, finance chairman, chairman of the Budget Committee, chairman of the state chairmen, and eleven additional members (a man and a woman from each of the regions, selected by the members of each region, and three members appointed by the chairman).

The auxiliary groups represented in the Executive Committee have grown from two (the National Federation of Republican Women and the Young Republican National Federation) to fifteen as of 1984. They are, in addition to the two mentioned above: the College Republican National Committee, the National Republican Heritage Groups Council, the National Black Republican Council, the Republican National Hispanic Assembly, the National Conference of Republican Mayors, the Republican leader of the U.S. Senate, the Republican leader of the U.S. House of Representatives, the Republican Governors Association, the National Conference of Republican County Officials, the National Republican Legislators Association, the National Association of Urban Republican County Chairmen, the representative of Jewish Americans, and Republicans Abroad International. The heads of these groups, who are non-voting members, plus the chairman's Executive Council, constitute the Executive Committee.

The importance of the Executive Committee has been disputed. In earlier years meetings of the Executive Committee were held at times other than when the whole committee met. These sessions were closed to the press, which allowed for free-wheeling discussions. Advice was given to the chairman, who was sometimes criticized. Strategy was planned, and programs were developed for presentation to the whole committee. The Executive Committee served a useful purpose by keeping in close touch with the chairman and acting as an advisory body. Today, the Executive Committee is very supportive of the chairman, serves as a sounding board, and assists the chairman in securing the support of other members.

The Executive Committee has always been limited in its authority. It cannot elect a chairman or other officers; it cannot ratify the members of the National Committee; it cannot issue the call of a national convention, designate the time or place of the national convention, or fill a vacancy in the office of candidate for President or Vice President.

Membership: At its inception the Republican National Committee was an organization of men--one from each state, from each territorial possession, and from the District of Columbia. In 1924, women were given equal voting membership in the RNC. This balance remained until 1952, when the Republican National Convention added state chairmen to the Republican National Committee if certain requirements were met. To qualify, a state must have cast its electoral vote for the Republican candidate for President in the preceding election, had a majority of the combined membership of the United States House of Representatives and Senate who were Republicans, or had a Republican

governor. Eventually all requirements were dropped and every state chairman became a member of the National Committee during his or her tenure.

The total number of members changed throughout the years as states were added to the union. Prior to World War II the Philippine Islands were represented on the National Committee. The 1972 convention added Guam to the committee. The total membership since that time has remained at 162-a man and woman from each of the fifty states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, and fifty-four state chairmen. Usually the state chairmen have been men; today, however, more and more women are serving in this post.

Women were involved in Republican political activities before they were allowed to vote and before they were made official members of the Republican National Committee. Women were recognized in the platform adopted by the 1872 Republican National Convention by acknowledgment of their "... noble devotion to the cause of freedom ..." and their participation in wider fields of endeavor. It was suggested that their honest demand for additional rights (the right to vote) be treated with "respectful consideration."

In 1876, a woman was allowed to address the Republican National Convention. In that convention a part of the platform discussed equal rights for women and gave modified approval. In 1892, two women were seated in the convention as alternate delegates and a woman addressed the convention. Limited recognition continued as the struggle for women's suffrage became more vocal and more popular. Then, in 1920, women for the first time were given the right to vote.

Prior to 1918, most of the record keeping of the Republican National Committee was done by one of its members elected to be the secretary. Minutes were brief and usually maintained in the office or home of the secretary. Most of such records have been lost; however, some of the business of the Republican National Committee can be found in contemporary newspaper accounts or in books by or about prominent members. The establishment of a permanent headquarters of the RNC in 1918 remedied this situation. This move was made by Chairman Will H. Hays. It was Hays also who, sensing the inevitability of women being given the right to vote and to participate in politics, asked Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick (Simms) of Illinois to take charge of women's activities. At that time she was chairman of the first Woman's Executive Committee of the Republican National Committee. A Women's Division was then established and officially recognized as such in a statement Chairman Hays made in a meeting of the Republican National Committee.

Character of Officers and Members: Since there are no mandatory qualifications for members of the National Committee other than residency in the state they represent, there is no one characteristic common among them other than their loyalty toward the Republican Party and their desire for it to be in control of state and national offices. From a broad viewpoint, the members would be identified for the most part as middle-aged, white, Protestant, and moderate or conservative in their political philosophy. They are usually men and women who have worked in party politics from the precinct level up and, by reason of such devotion and close association with their fellow Republicans in the state they represent, are elected to serve on the National Committee. The position of National Committee member is considered prestigious, affording access to the leaders of the party and carrying with it certain social advantages.

In the early days of the party, the members of the National Committee, who were all men, typically were heads of important businesses, lawyers, professional men of various fields, U.S. senators, congressmen, and governors. More often than not they were men of considerable wealth and influence.

This was not necessarily the case with state chairmen, although some members of the National Committee graduated from the role of state chairman to that of national committeeman or, in a few cases, committeewoman. State chairmen, with few exceptions, serve short terms (two to four years), their length of service usually being dependent upon the success of the party in their states. They frequently leave the management and organization of politics to run for a political office. As a rule state chairmen are younger than national committeemen and women and serve in their positions as full-time paid employees. This latter status is a new development, however; it is only in the last twenty to twenty-five years that national and state chairmen have been paid.

National chairmen were usually men who were financially able to donate their time to the position. They were often members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, dividing their time

between the National Committee and Capitol Hill. This made it necessary for them to rely on capable assistants to carry out their wishes and see to the required business of the committee. Today, the rules require that the chairman and co-chairman be full-time paid employees. Politics is no longer a seasonal occupation; it is a profession that requires expertise and full-time attention.

The composition of the National Committee has changed over the years. Now one finds younger, aggressive men and women serving as state chairmen; numerous nationalities and religious faiths are also represented. Black representation is small, but an auxiliary has been established as the National Black Republican Council, the chairman of which serves on the Executive Committee. Other auxiliaries have been organized to reach out to Hispanics, Jews, and other groups.

Responsibilities: The present rules state, "the Republican National Committee shall have the general management of the Republican Party in the United States, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, subject to direction from the national convention."

What is the "general management"? Each state has its own methods of procedure, programs, and problems. Therefore, the management functions the National Committee can exert have to be limited to certain broad activities. It can raise funds to promote candidates, create publicity for the party in general and for candidates, provide information, assist in the use of political techniques, train campaign managers and staff members, commission polls, provide major speakers for state events, assist the state party organization through the use of computer systems, and perform major research for the use of candidates and state party committees. The National Committee also acts as a liaison between the White House and state parties when the party is in power.

The most important responsibility of the National Committee has been, and still is, the national convention. The National Committee is the only body that selects the site, sets the hour and day, issues the call, makes physical arrangements, plans the program, and certifies the temporary roll of delegates and alternate delegates. The members of the National Committee, as individuals, have always taken a major part in this function. In fact, they jealously guard their right to do so.

Fund raising has been a constant responsibility and burden of the Republican National Committee. Before state and federal laws restricted and defined political contributions, fund raising was primarily the responsibility of the wealthy members of the party, who solicited funds from among their friends and business associates and gave of their personal resources. The elected treasurer of the National Committee not only accounted for the use of all funds, but was personally responsible for raising a great deal of money.

In 1934, the Republican National Committee adopted a motion authorizing the treasurer to incur an indebtedness not to exceed \$25,000 for the purposes of the party, to appoint assistant treasurers for such states as he might desire, and to appoint an assistant treasurer of the Republican National Committee to assist him. In 1935, the National Committee authorized the appointment of a Finance Committee, which was formalized in 1936. Since then the chairman of the Republican National Finance Committee has been an important member of the Republican National Committee. With few exceptions those who have served as finance chairman have been men of great personal wealth, heads of national corporations, or men of such professional or personal background that virtually all possible sources of contributions are open to them.

In recent times fund raising has taken many forms: special events attended by the President, subscriptions to newsletters and party magazines, membership dues, solicitation of small contributors, creation of elite clubs of large donors who may be invited to the White House or attend events where the President is present, and others. In addition, the advent of computers, word processors, and mailing lists certainly has enhanced the party's ability to raise funds. Political Action Committees (PACs) also aid the parties in raising funds, although they are frequently criticized as special interest sources, and the threat of abolition or more federal control is always present.

Meetings: The Republican National Committee traditionally meets for the first time immediately following the national convention. Since that is a presidential election year, the committee may meet again prior to the election to discuss the progress of the campaign and strategy. If the party wins the presidential election, the next meeting is usually held in January just prior to the inauguration of the new President.

The agenda for meetings has been approximately the same for many years: call to order, roll call, appointment of Committee on Proxies, announcement of vacancies, ratification of new members, and introduction of new state chairmen, followed by reports by the co-chairman and finance chairman, and some staff reports. The chairman may give a major speech at a luncheon or dinner, or he may give a general report during the business session. The rest of the agenda depends upon the political season.

In meetings of the National Committee there are occasional controversies that require debate and sometimes a roll-call vote or secret ballot. Until recent years the Republican National Committee was governed by the rules of the House of Representatives, which did not allow a secret ballot. Meetings are now conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, which permits a secret ballot. Such a vote may be used, and has been in the case of a site for the national convention and the election of a chairman. When the party is in power, the committee usually follows the wishes of the President.

Committees: The main committees of the RNC are those connected with the planning of the National Nominating Convention. They are the Committee on Site, the Committee on Call, the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Contests, and the Committee on Arrangements. Other committees are created from time to time to meet special needs. One notable example is the Republican Coordinating Committee that was designed to bring a unified voice for the party after the heavy losses in the 1964 presidential election.

National Headquarters: A permanent headquarters was established in Washington, D.C., in 1918 by Chairman Will H. Hays. Offices were rented in various buildings, usually modest in size. The number of staff members varied according to political activity. During a presidential campaign it became necessary to secure additional office space and increase the staff substantially. After much agitation, investigation, and consideration, the National Committee voted to move into its own building on Capitol Hill. This was to be a complex of three buildings to be known as the Dwight D. Eisenhower National Republican Headquarters. The first portion was built and occupied in 1970; the adjoining social club was soon started; and finally a wing was added to the original building, which accommodates the National Republican Congressional Committee offices.

At an unspecified date in the future these files will be permanently deposited in the libraries of Republican Presidents.
