SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Civil Rights During the Carter Administration, 1977–1981, Part 1: Papers of the Special Assistant for Black Affairs, Section B compiles a large set of documents on significant civil rights issues, events, and personalities during the 1977–1981 presidency of Jimmy Carter. The focus of the documents is on both positive and negative aspects: equal opportunity on the one side, entrenched discrimination on the other.

The documents are those collected by the office of Louis E. Martin, special assistant to the president, who oversaw the Carter administration's handling of civil rights issues and minority affairs and kept a close eye on black America's views on Carter's policies. Although the majority of documents focus on blacks, the collection contains some interesting material on social, economic, and political issues affecting Hispanics, Indians, and (especially) women.

The documents in the collection consist of correspondence from and reports by individuals and private organizations, newspaper articles and editorials, internal White House memoranda, press conference transcripts, press releases, correspondence between White House and federal agency officials, government reports, and invitation lists for major events.

The collection includes material about, or written or spoken by, prominent personalities including President Jimmy Carter; Vice President Walter F. Mondale; Special Assistant to the President Louis E. Martin and his key aides Julia M. Dobbs, I. Ray Miller Jr., and Karen W. Zuniga; administration officials Elizabeth Abramowitz, Zbigniew Brzezinski, Joseph A. Califano Jr., Benjamin R. Civiletti, Stuart E. Eizenstat, Patricia R. Harris, James T. McIntyre Jr., Jack Watson, Sarah Weddington, Anne Wexler, and Andrew Young; congressional representatives Shirley Chisholm, Cardiss Collins, Walter E. Fauntroy, Augustus F. Hawkins, and Parren J. Mitchell; civil rights leaders Dick Gregory, Aaron E. Henry, Benjamin Hooks, Jesse L. Jackson, Vernon E. Jordan Jr., Coretta Scott King, Joseph Lowery, Clarence Mitchell, and Leon H. Sullivan; and several interesting documents by Muhammad Ali.

Researchers interested in the multiplicity of viewpoints held by minorities, as well as the organizations they formed to advance them, will welcome the collection's compilation of documents from a large number of minority associations and institutions, particularly black organizations, on discrimination, civil rights, equal opportunity, economic development, and related issues. Officials from these groups often present forceful program proposals to President Carter or Louis Martin, and express their approval or disapproval of administration policies.

Black Lawyers, Center for Sickle Cell Disease, Citizens Coalition, Coalition of Black Trade Unionists, Committee for Concerned Blacks, Concerned Clergy for Carter, Congressional Black Caucus, Council of Urban League Guilds, Cultural Council Foundation, Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), Federation of Southern Cooperatives, Institute of Black Democratic Politics, International Association of Black Professional Fire Fighters, Joint Center for Political Studies, Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, League of United Latin American Citizens, League To Improve the Community, Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Social Change, Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, National Alliance of Postal and Federal Employees, National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education, National Association for Sickle Cell Disease, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, National Association of Black Journalists, National Association of Negro Business and Professional Womens Clubs Inc., National Association of Women Judges, National Bar Association, National Black Caucus of State Legislators, National Black Economic Advisory Council, National Black Police Association, National Black Network, National Business League, National Caucus on the Black Aged, National Conference of Artists, National Conference of Black Mayors, National Conference of Black Political Scientists, National Council of Negro Women, National Urban Coalition, National Urban League, Opportunities Industrialization Centers, Poor People's Development Foundation, Pro and Con Screening Board, United Federation of Teachers Black Heritage Committee, United Negro College Fund, Volunteers Intervening for Equity, and Washington Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law.

The following sections outline the major topics covered by this collection.

Social Issues

During the late 1970s, blacks and other minorities continued to confront inequalities in various social and cultural realms. One of the most vexing was discrimination in education. Collection authors examine the unequal opportunities for blacks as they tried to obtain a quality higher education. Authors discuss the implications for affirmative action of the landmark Supreme Court case *Regents of the University of California v. Allan Bakke*, as well as other "reverse discrimination" controversies.

Collection documents also provide broad coverage of President Carter's personally directed Black College Initiative to increase dramatically the involvement of federal agencies with historically black colleges and universities. This program expanded federal support of the colleges through means such as grants for research libraries or medical schools, as well as federal agency research and development contracts. Louis Martin and his deputy Karen W. Zuniga had their hands full as they tried to persuade or compel federal agencies such as the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to comply with the president's directive.

Although much progress had been made since the 1954 *Brown v. Board of Education* Supreme Court decision banning racial segregation, the 1979 White House ceremony marking the twenty-fifth anniversary of the decision provided an opportunity for assessing the long-term impact of the decision. President Carter, as well as many civil

rights leaders, noted that the nation needed to accomplish a great deal more if it were to attain the national goal of equal educational opportunity. A number of authors argue that a strong relationship exists between urban unrest and a lower quality of education in central cities.

In an address to the Joint Center for Political Studies (Reel 13, Frame 0001), scientist, teacher, civil rights leader, and former American Psychological Association President Kenneth L. Clark delivers some of the most passionate statements in this collection. Clark refers to “the psychological genocide which American racism and racial segregation impose upon human beings.... Mathematically speaking, I would suggest that the movement of blacks into the middle class is arithmetic, while the movement of blacks into the under class is geometric. This is the key fact (about civil rights progress).” Elsewhere in this address, Clark notes: “It is my considered opinion that the core of this problem of an increasing number of black underclass trapped in the inner cities is the problem of criminally inferior public education which these children face.... We must mobilize all of our political power, the resources of all of our civil rights organizations, all of our community groups to upgrade the quality of education for working class children, low-income children, (and) minority group children in our public schools.”

Another key social issue during the Carter years was the discrimination against blacks and other minorities in their attempts to find decent housing in geographical areas of their choice. Several authors assess HUD’s efforts to enforce nondiscrimination provisions of housing laws and conclude that these efforts need to be more vigorous. Crime in public housing is the subject of interesting reports whose authors describe a crime prevention program in a Chicago, Illinois, public housing project. In this housing project, minority families formed a League To Improve the Community, a cooperative program involving both tenants and state and local public agencies, as well as the Chicago police, the National Black Police Association, and the Afro-American Patrolmen’s League, operating with a grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (Reel 1, Frames 0190 and 0311).

Deeply concerned about the problem of distinctly unequal housing opportunity, the White House made a huge effort in both 1979 and 1980 to pass one of its most important pieces of social legislation, the Fair Housing Act Amendments. White House staffers sent urgent letters to minority leaders and groups, conducted intense lobbying with congressional representatives and senators perceived to be undecided, formulated bill markup strategies, enlisted the support of an interagency Federal Fair Housing Strategy among federal agencies other than HUD, distributed supporting materials to groups like the National League of Cities and the U.S. Conference of Mayors, and scheduled public addresses and press releases in support of the amendments by administration officials.

Other documents with a social focus cover discrimination against or the serious problems confronting older minority persons, as well as handicapped children. One document provides a hopeful glimpse of the Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center, a privately operated social services agency serving poor neighborhoods in Houston, Texas (Reel 19, Frame 903). Several black organizations devoted great effort to help refugees from Cuba and Haiti receive asylum and successful cultural assimilation in the United States. One document includes graphic statements by Haitian refugees on the brutal, sadistic treatment they received at the hands of the Duvalier regime in Haiti, which caused them to leave fearing for their lives (Reel 9, Frame 0150). Of special concern to

black and other minority organizations was the undercount of minorities in the decennial census. The collection additionally includes reports on various aspects of the mass media. Several documents provide provocative analyses of the stereotypical, harmful portrayal of blacks in television programs and motion pictures. Finally, the collection contains information on the highly positive Poor Peoples Development Foundation Inc. (PPDF) and its energetic founder, Cornbread Givens. PPDF's single purpose was to establish cooperatives, especially farm-to-market, in poor and minority neighborhoods.

Economic Problems

The Carter Administration was determined to narrow the economic gaps between the minority population and the rest of the country. The administration provided financial and technical assistance to blacks and other minorities through programs of the Small Business Administration, the Economic Development Administration, the Office of Minority Business Enterprise, the Community Services Administration (CSA), and others. The Commerce Department sponsored Federal Economic Assistance Conferences in major cities across the country, and the private National Minority Purchasing Council worked with the administration to increase substantially the procurement of goods and services by major corporations by minority-owned businesses.

President Carter, as well as many minority leaders and organizations, saw the high rate of unemployment among the minority population, especially youth, as the most urgent social problem. The Administration established or expanded a number of programs to provide both jobs and job training for the unemployed, such as the Summer Youth Employment Program, a minority students' research apprenticeship program, and Jobs for Youth. The last program was a joint public-private partnership between federal agencies and Opportunities Industrialization Centers, a private organization headed by Leon H. Sullivan. Sullivan's group had an ambitious goal: to train and then place 100,000 youths in permanent private and public sector jobs. Another private group, the Council of the Great City Schools, established an ambitious program with Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funding to provide in-school job training programs in large city school systems.

In addition, this collection includes significant bodies of material on other Carter Administration initiatives to close economic disparities between whites and minorities. Several authors examine the structure and operations of the Minority Bank Development Program, in which federal agencies deposited funds in banks located in inner city minority neighborhoods.

A number of collection documents examine equal employment opportunity. Authors assess enforcement by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) of equal opportunity, affirmative action, and sex discrimination laws, as well as the agency's coordination of federal equal employment opportunity programs. Equal employment within federal agencies like HEW, CSA, and the U.S. Postal Service is the focus of several documents. In a highly interesting report, the author examines tensions between black and Hispanic employees of CSA after the agency's reorganization. Various high-level black employees alleged that CSA chief Graciela Olivarez discriminated against blacks. The Committee for Concerned Blacks contended that Olivarez refused to let blacks have a significant voice or hold important posts in CSA. The committee also

asserted that various CSA officials downgraded the civil service ratings of positions held by certain blacks, or transferred them to lower-grade and lower-pay job classifications.

The collection additionally includes interesting material on Administration energy policy, including its proposed stand-by gasoline rationing program, as well as a U.S. trade mission to Africa led by U.S. representative to the United Nations Andrew Young. Finally, various authors provide information on Carter's major effort to appoint blacks, other minorities, and women to high-level federal positions and federal judgeships.

White House Politics

Many documents in this collection portray the dynamic interaction of Louis E. Martin and his staff with other officials in the White House, as well as with federal agency officials and with leaders of a large number of minority group organizations, which included many well-known figures in the civil rights movement. In addition to lobbying for the Fair Housing Act Amendments and the Black College Initiative, described above, the Martin group played an active part in President Carter's 1980 reelection effort. Firmly believing that the black vote could provide the margin of victory in swing states like Ohio and Illinois, the Democratic National Committee and minority organizations conducted massive voter registration drives. In addition, the White House held briefings for black clergy in large states, hoping that the ministers would entreat their congregations to vote for Carter. Over and over, the Carter team and its supporters outside the government attempted to drive home the message that Carter had done much more for blacks than either the media or certain black leaders acknowledged.

In addition, there was great concern over the candidacy of Senator Edward M. Kennedy, who was viewed as having strong and growing appeal among many minority voters and women. Several collection documents include detailed running tallies of the delegates committed to or leaning toward Kennedy versus Carter.

This collection is not all politics. It includes a number of documents and document sections of interest to historians and students of popular culture. A profile of Howard University English Professor Arthur P. Davis, for example, contains descriptions of the evolution of teaching black literature, as well as the Harlem Renaissance during the 1920s: "This enjoyment [of Harlem] was not the phony exotic primitivism which the white folk came uptown nightly to find in cabarets and other hot spots. Our enjoyment was in part the pride of having a city of our very own—a city of black intellectuals and artists, of peasants just up from the South, of West Indians and Africans, of Negroes of all kinds and classes" (Reel 10, Frame 0141).

Civil Rights During the Carter Administration, 1977–1981, Part 1: Papers of the Special Assistant for Black Affairs, Section B compiles a large set of documents on significant civil rights issues, events, and personalities during the 1977–1981 presidency of Jimmy Carter. The focus of the documents is on both positive and negative aspects of this topic: equal opportunity on the one side, entrenched discrimination on the other.

The documents are those collected by the office of Louis E. Martin, special assistant to the president, who oversaw the Carter administration's handling of civil rights issues and minority affairs and kept a close eye on black America's views on Carter's policies.

Highlighted in this collection are several major administration programs including the passage of the Fair Housing Amendments Act, the Black College Initiative, the Minority Bank Development Program, increased procurement from minority-owned business firms, Carter's appointments of minority and women federal officials and judges, youth employment and training programs, and the enforcement of affirmative action. The collection additionally includes interesting material on administration energy policies, including its stand-by gasoline rationing program.

The collection documents an era of disenchantment among minority citizens with federal government programs. As one black writer said, "It is difficult to sell the virtues of the Administration to black people when too many of them have no idea what the Administration has done." Nevertheless, Louis Martin wrote to Carter in his resignation letter: "I am certain that history will do justice to your leadership and your achievements during one of the most complex and critical periods in the nation's history."
