## Prospects of Mankind

## Summary:

From 1959 through 1962, former First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt hosted twenty-nine roundtable discussions to tackle critical issues of the day that were important to Americans, as well as to the international community of academics, journalists, philosophers, and politicians.

Participants in these forums included some of the most important names of the twentieth century, such as future Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger; Nobel Prize winner Ralph Bunche; Senator Hubert Humphrey; theologian Paul Tillich; Nobel Prize winner philosopher Bertrand Russell; Senator Adlai Stevenson; economist John Kenneth Galbraith; Governor Nelson Rockefeller; Director of the Peace Corps, R. Sargent Shriver; Secretary of State, Allen Dulles; and future president, John F. Kennedy.

Mrs. Roosevelt and her panelists address such specific subjects as American capitalism, the development of the Peace Corps, the role of television in American lives, disarmament, foreign aid, democracy abroad, and the status of women. Other programs also address the challenges faced by foreign nations including Africa, China, Cuba, East Germany, France, Great Britain, and Russia.

Produced by public television station WGBH, Boston for National Educational Television (NET), more than half of these programs were recorded on the campus of Brandeis University in Waltham, Massachusetts. Other venues for programs included the BBC Studios in London, the State Department in Washington, D.C., and the United Nations in New York City. "The format was that of a colloquium, based on crucial national and international issues, between Mrs. Roosevelt and her guests in the presence of interested Brandeis students", noted Abram Sachar, former Brandeis president in his book "A Host at Last".

**Prospects of Mankind** allowed viewers a rare and valuable opportunity to witness history in the making, and the significance of this series cannot be underestimated. These twentynine programs are not merely time capsules, but serve as important resources for scholars, historians, and even policy makers in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.
