The RIAS, in collaboration with six other European institutions, is launching the European Forum on US History, a new monthly hybrid seminar series on US history. Our partnership consists of the following research centres:

Together, our seven institutes will curate a rotating, hybrid seminar series that deepens historiographical and interdisciplinary exchange, broadens our geographic reach, diversifies scholarly voices, and creates new opportunities for joint workshops, doctoral mentoring, and collaborative publications. By fostering an inclusive platform for scholars and reaffirming our shared commitment to cutting-edge research on US history, we sustain vital cross-border collaboration at a moment when restrictions on academic freedom make such partnerships more essential than ever.

This series, one of the very few of its kind in Europe, intersects with various significant historiographical trends, continuing the move towards a more integrated view of US and North American history. It pays special attention to the inclusion of global, imperial, transnational, and interconnected histories to reframe our understanding of the United States' place in the world and the emerging focus on international environmental history and issues.

The platform, which meets once a month in a hybrid format, encourages active participation from doctoral students and serves as an open and inclusive forum for discussing some of the most innovative recent scholarship. It aspires to bring together historians of different backgrounds and in different stages of their careers, foster a historiographical and interdisciplinary conversation, and critically consider the contemporary societal and political ramifications of the historical events under discussion.

Five of the seven partner institutes are members of the American Studies Network (ASN), a consortium of European American studies centres affiliated with the European Association for American Studies (EAAS).

Beth Wilson is a Lecturer in History at Cardiff University, having previously held a British Academy Postdoctoral Fellowship at the Rothermere American Institute and University of Reading. Beth's first monograph, "I Felt All This": Enslaved People's Emotional Lives in the Antebellum US South, will be published by Cambridge University Press next year. Drawing on methods from the history of emotions to study enslaved people's lives, her book exposes the social, cultural and political role that emotion played in the US South. Beth has also published articles on slavery, emotions and gender in Slavery and Abolition and American Nineteenth Century History. She also recently co-edited a collection, Slavery and Emotions in the Atlantic World, alongside Emily West.

In her paper, Dr. Wilson draws on history of emotions methods to **explore enslaved people's emotional lives** in the antebellum US South. Re-considering a well-analysed source set, the Works Progress Administration interviews conducted in the 1930s with formerly enslaved people, her paper considers two moments of collective emotional expression that formerly enslaved people testified to - **sale and religious gatherings**. Exploring patterns in these individual accounts of collective emotion, this paper will reveal how enslaved people navigated enslavers' restrictions on their emotions, created gendered and spatially defined emotional standards for expression that sat in explicit opposition to these restrictions and ultimately, how enslaved people developed their own emotional frameworks to **resist** and **survive** the institution of slavery.
